Open Lecture

Local Strategy for Strengthening Local Money Circulation in Global Society

Many local communities in Japan are facing serious population decline and local economic deterioration. To overcome this adverse situation, strong and sustainable local money circulation needs to be fostered in local areas, and assessment conducted of its impact on the economy at the local community level.

In this series of open lecture, first, Elizabeth Cox, invited from the New Economic Foundation (NEF), in London, will lecture on NEF's mission and an easy-measurement tool, LM3 that it has designed to help local people and organizations who aim to improve the local economy, as well as to influence the public sector to consider the impact of its procurement decisions. Second, Ko Fujiyama from Shimane Prefectural Mountainous Region Research Centre will present a review of regional economic research in Japan and future prospects. Third, we will discuss the possibility of designing and implementing an easy-measureable tool such as LM3 in Japan, its significance for strengthening local money circulation in a globalising society, and practical actions that would need to be taken.

Ko Fujiyama (Research Producer, Shimane Prefectural Mountainous Region Research Centre)


